 - Fusible batting: fuse to quilt back
 - Fuse your batting scraps and use for pillows, baby quilts, mug rugs, quilt as you go



Art Quilt Workshop - April 11, 2026

Barbara from Wyverns Trove located in Columbus, WI will be leading an **Impressionist Art Quilt Workshop** for our guild. There will be kits with inspiration pictures and fabrics to get you started. Kit themes include: landscapes, pets, window scenes, flower bouquets, wreaths, and the like. All kits are different and Barbara plans to bring extras so there will be plenty of variety.

What you need to do for this workshop:

- ☐ Decide your quilt size (larger quilts are easier to create an image)
 - □ 20"x30" \$15
 - □ 24"x36" \$20
 - □ 30"x40" \$30
- ☐ If you have novelty fabrics/scraps, please start setting them aside to use in your quilt and to be able to share/swap with others. Leaves, flowers, fur, animals, insects, bricks, rocks, trees, sky, clouds, grass and the like.

Helpful skills include knowing how to make: 4 patch, 16 patch, snow ball corners, and half square triangles from two pieces of fabric the same size as the finished square. (I plan on including how-to's in the next few newsletters so everyone knows these techniques.)

Registration will be open at the Dec & Jan meetings.

Block Basics = 4 Patch and 16 Patch

(esp. in prep for the Art Quilt Workshop)


First off, a 4 Patch is a 2x2 grid quilt block and a 16 Patch is a 4x4 grid quilt block.

- Strip piecing is a fast assembly method for these types of blocks. Sew strips long sides together, press, then sub cut the strips. Rotate your sub cut pieces, sew together, press, and trim to size.
- 4 Patch Block Construction

- The math is relatively easy.
 - Figure out your finished block size.
 - Divide that number by 2 (for a 4 patch) or 4 (for a 16 patch)
 - Add ½ an inch for seam allowance. This is your cut size, whether you cut pieces individually or as a strip.
 - For strip piecing, the above measurement is also the size for sub-cutting the assembled strip.

So, for example:

~If I want a 6 inch finished 4-Patch block, I divide 6" by 2, equaling 3". Add ½ an inch for the seam allowance. So I cut (either pieces or strips) at 3.5 inches. ~For a 6 inch finished 16-Patch block, I divide 6" by 4, equaling 1.5". Add ½ an inch for the seam allowance. So your cut size is 2".

CUTTING INSTRUCTIONS

Fabric 1:

A – (5) 3" squares

Fabric 2:


- B (5) 3" squares
- C − (4) 2 ½" squares

Fabric 3:

• D – (12) 2 ½" squares

Fabric 4:

 E – (6) 2 ½" × 4 ½" rectangles




Fabric 5:

• F − (1) 4 ½" square


SEWING INSTRUCTIONS

HST = HALF-SQUARE TRIANGLE, SNF = STITCH AND FLIP


- 1. Draw a diagonal line on the wrong side of (5) A squares, (4) C squares, and (12) D squares.
- 2. Place (5) A squares with (5) B squares, right sides together. Sew a ¼" away from both sides of the drawn diagonal lines. Cut along the drawn diagonal lines, making (10) HST units. Trim HST units to measure 2 ½" × 2 ½" unfinished. (You will only need 9 HST units for this block.)



- Place (6) D squares onto bottom left corners of (6) E – rectangles, right sides together. Sew along the drawn diagonal lines. Trim excess corner fabric to ¼". Press toward the corners.
- Repeat SNF technique to attach (6) D squares onto bottom right corners of the same E – rectangles to make (6) Flying Geese units measuring 2 ½" × 4 ½" unfinished.




5. Place (2) C – squares onto opposite corners of (1) F – square, right sides together. Sew along the drawn diagonal lines. Trim excess corner fabric to a ¼". Press toward the corners. Repeat on remaining corners to make (1) SNF unit. The SNF unit should measure 4 ½" × 4 ½" unfinished.





Arrange (3) Flying Geese units as shown.
 Sew Flying Geese units in a row and press.
 The Flying Geese row should measure
 4 ½" × 6 ½" unfinished. Repeat to make a second row.



 Arrange pieced HST unit, (2) Flying Geese rows, and (1) SNF unit as shown. Sew units in pairs and press. Then sew the pairs together and press to complete Block 16. Block 16 should measure 10 ½" × 10 ½" unfinished.
